THE DIFFERENT POINTS TO USE

A point is a request to speak made by a representative. There are several types of points:

- **Point of Information:** A Point of Information is a question addressed to the speaker after their speech. It must relate to the content of the speech and be phrased as a question. If this is not the case, the Chair may ask for rewording or reject the point
- **Point of Procedure (aka. Point of Order):** A Point of Procedure concerns the failure of a delegate or a Chair to follow the Rules of Procedure. The Chair may ignore this point without changing their decision. If a representative challenges a decision, they may appeal by explaining their objection, and the Presidency may intervene in case of disagreement.
- **Point of Translation :** A request for oral translation made to the interpreters or the Chairs. This point cannot be ignored..
- **Point of Personal Privilege :** A request for the Chairs to change something making you uncomfortable, such as temperature, technical issues, inability to hear the speaker or such as needing to go to the restroom .This is the only point that may interrupt a speaker.
- **Right of Reply :** Allows a representative to respond immediately to another participant if they feel personally targeted. The delegate must request a Right of Reply from the Chairs, who may grant or deny it. After hearing both perspectives, the Chairs may request apologies if necessary.

THE DIFFERENT MOTIONS TO USE

Motions are requests made by representatives to the Chairs. There are several types of motions, and it is up to the Chairs to approve them or not.

- **Motion to Move into Voting Procedure :** Can be requested when a debate is considered unnecessary or feels that the topic has been thoroughly discussed, allowing the committee to proceed directly to voting in order to address another topic. Any objection leads to automatic rejection.
- **Motion for an Unmoderated Caucus:** An informal form of debate where delegates are free to leave their seats and discuss with other delegates. This motion is normally made when it is time to merge or write draft resolutions.
- **Motion for a Moderated Caucus:** A form of continuous debate in which speakers give their positions on the topics at hand. Normally, you must give a purpose, speaking time, and total time when making this motion.
- **Motion for a Reality Check: :** Used by Chairs or delegates to correct unrealistic proposals or statements that contradict the represented position. The floor must then be returned to the Presidency.
- **Motion for Apology :** Allows a delegate to request public apologies for an offensive speech, if accepted by the Chairs.
- **Motion of censure :** Requested when a delegate's speech or behavior is deemed inappropriate. If accepted, the targeted delegate is temporarily excluded.
